## Old Farts Truck of the Issue



### Jim & Georgia Ryan's 1966 Chevrolet P/U

We purchased our project '66 about 3 years ago with a tired motor, interior & paint job for \$3500. We began a frame-off freshening in November 2004 at our shop Ryan Signs & Graphics in Fort Mohave, AZ. An acquaintance agreed to address the bodywork needs, and create a custom paint job, bead-blasting sheet-metal, etc. Unfortunately, 6 months went by with little progress, and we decided to pursue the exterior requirements ourselves. During this time of a little fender prep here, a little jamb spray there, we found a 454ci BBC from the salvage yard for \$500. It ended up being a 2000 model year GM Goodwrench engine, which was topped by a polished hi-rise manifold. Daily responsibilities made finishing the '66 a way long-term prospect, so it was decided to trailer it to So-Cal and have Uncle Larry of LAW Creations work the details of finishing a rolling project.

Larry handled the final body part hanging, Engine peripheral installs/tuning, custom dash fabrication & components throughout wired. Doug's Headers were ceramic-coated, and exhaust plumbed. It was driven across the desert back to our home in Arizona the week after Show & Go 2005, with no problem.

We enjoyed driving (tire-smoking!) our hot rod around Mohave Valley/Bullhead City/Laughlin for nearly 6 months before getting up the nerve to re-paint the entire Truck at one time. We decided after painting 6 or so golf carts at our shop, we were "ready". We got out our Mike Lavalee DVD of "TrueFire" airbrush art, went through it a few times, and went to work... A new base coat, the airbrush TrueFire paint job (5 hrs.) and clear coat were all done in the garage. And "Yes, I painted it myself." By the way, paint-gun used was courtesy of Stanley E., a Sata HVLP that I truly love to use. The Truck has made several trips to Riverside, including Show & Go 2006, with no problems at all.

We have been truly surprised and pleased at the compliments & attention our home-grown project has garnered. Special thanks to Uncle Larry/LAW Creations, WCB, Kenny A., and Stanley E. My most thanks to my beautiful bride Georgia for her hard work, and helping with the color-sanding- Now there's a job we could have done without! Next project will be the addition of Air Conditioning.

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Shop Tools Described and Appreciated:
